D. THOUGHT OF THE DAY: Commissioner Harvey: I want to talk about one of our great assets in Weber County. Our Peery's Egyptian Theater recently received a \$1M donation that went toward a digital lighting upgrade. The seats have been replaced and floors upgraded. It's a beautiful theater that we are very fortunate to have. It even has a theater organ still; one of four or five such organs in the nation. But our greatest asset in the theater is the staff.

E. PUBLIC COMMENT:

1. Maris Bischoff, Ogden, UT: A Concern that has bothered me for 12 years. In 2005-2006, the AAA bond rating for Weber County was received through the work of (Commission names). Since that time, I have seen campaign materials saying they achieved the AAA bonding. It's not honest, it's not ethical, it's not true. Response: Ricky Hatch (Clerk/Auditor): Bond ratings are achieved for each individual bond issuance. While the first AAA bond in 2005-2006 was great and we certainly have built off the processes and benefits of prior elected county officials, since then, the county has over the past 6 to 7 years on its own obtained AAA ratings

for other bonds. The bond rating is for each specific bond.

2. Sylvia Salsbury, Ogden, UT: Item number F8 has caught my attention due to 2000 Mules. I was wondering

why Ogden was not included on the list of cities?

Response: Mr. Hatch: Cities listed do not have surveillance in place. Ogden City will most likely be on in the future as we could not get to all the cities on this round of interlocals.

2. APPROVE OF CONTRACT WITH ZIONS BANK PUBLIC FINANCE, INC., FOR FINANCIAL ADVISORY SERVICES, INCLUDING DEBT ISSUANCES, REFINANCING AND EVALUATING THE ECONOMIC IMPACTS OF DEVELOPMENTS.

Scott Parke (Comptroller): We have used Zion's Bank in the past and have done a really good job for us. They help us realize and achieve the details behind our financial plan.

Commissioner Harvey moved to approve contract with Zions Bank Public Finance, Inc., for financial advisory services, including debt issuances, refinancing and evaluating the economic impacts of developments; Commissioner Froerer seconded.

Chris Crockett (Deputy County Attorney): Demands for their services forces them to need a new facility. This particular development agreement is a rezone from single family residential and open space to community commercial conditional overlay to allow the new center to be built in accordance with requirements in Ogden City.

Commissioner Froerer moved to approve a Development Agreement with Ogden City to rezone land at 1845 Jackson Avenue to allow the construction of a new Children's Justice Center; Commissioner Harvey seconded. Commissioner Froerer – aye; Commissioner Harvey – aye; Chair Jenkins – aye

4. APPROVE A MASTER SERVICE AGREEMENT WITH TONAQUINT FOR A VIRTUAL SERVER PROVIDER THAT HOSTS CASE MANAGEMENT SOFTWARE FOR THE WEBER COUNTY ATTORNEY'S OFFICE.

Jamie Pitt (Attorney): Servers are moving to new virtual server provider to host the case management system. It's easier to have them host all of our data, system updates, and service. Current case management system provider is doing away with the system. We have to pay to move away from their current contract. The new company, Pine Tech, will actually host the current program for three to five years while they write a new case management program.

Commissioner Harvey moved to approve a Master Service Agreement with Tonaquint for a virtual server provider that hosts case management software for the Weber County Attorney's Office; Commissioner Froerer seconded.

5. FINAL SUBDIVISION APPROVAL OF THE BASIN SUBDIVISION CONSISTING OF 10 LOTS LOCATED AT 947 E OLD SNOW BASIN ROAD, HUNTSVILLE- UVB050721.

Steve Burton (Planning): Developer has put up an escrow for offsite improvements. Prior development agreement limits subdivision to 10 lots. This development meets minimum requirements for FR3 zone with 6000 square foot lots with 80 feet of frontage. Developer's portion of intersection upgrade approximately \$85k; funds in escrow. Planning Commission recommended final approval on February 15th, 2022. Staff also recommends approval.

A subdivision improvement agreement prepared with a letter of credit approved through the Treasurer of \$1,548166.55. The existing sewage system is capable of handling this subdivision. Current Staff recommends approval.
